On this 12th day of January 1846 Personally appeared before me one of the acting Justices of the peace for said District George Sage a resident of said State & District aged Eighty three years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832

That he entered the Service of the United States under the following named officers and served as being stated. (over) That he entered the Service of the United States ^{under General Lincoln} in 1779 as a volunteer, & served as a private in Capt. Washington's Company that our Captain was our Lieut. that our Richardson was our Colonel, that our Col. was our Major & that he served a term of six months during which term we marched to Savannah & then up the Savannah River to Augusta & then he was discharged. He then volunteered under Gen. Green in Capt. Lyle's Company our Lieutenant was our Major & our John Lyle was our Colonel that he served that term a term of six months during which term we marched to Milledgeville & then to the Putnam Springs and was in that battle (by the battle of the Clouds) then he volunteered under General Marion in the Cavalry and served a term of four months he marched from Georgetown to Pedee & then back to Georgetown & then they marched towards Charleston & come up Santee & then he got his discharge. Then he was drafted and served a term of three months in the Militia under General Ferson our Major Lyle was our Capt. and our John Lyle was our Colonel & then he was drafted & served a term of three months each under General Thomas & John Munn was our Colonel & Thomas Lyle was our Capt. that he done all his Service as a private & that the whole amount of his Service was at least two years

That he resided in Fairfield District South Carolina
 when he entered the Service & that his Service was
 all done in South Carolina & that he has no docu-
 -mentary evidence of his Service & that he knows of no
 person whose testimony he can procure to be com-
 -mitted to his Service. He further declares that his
 Name is not on the Pension roll of the Agency
 of any State.
